
" Sharps" or "needlestick" injury

A "sharps" or "needlestick" injury is one in which blood or body fluid from one person is inoculated into another on the point of a needle, scalpel, lancet or other sharp object.



Encourage the area to bleed.



Wash area with soap under running water (but without scrubbing).



Dry and protect the injury site with impermeable dressing.





" Sharps" or "needlestick" injury



Attend the Occupational Health department ASAP



Report the incident to the doctor or nurse in charge of the area where you are working.

Complete an incident form.

Report the accident to the College Health and Safety Advisers.

The major health risks to someone receiving a sharps injury are Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, and HIV infection.
